Should you Add an Above Ground Pool Heater This Year?

Living in a cooler climate means you already have a shorter swimming season. However, with the right above ground pool heater, you can extend your season and swim longer this year.

There are multiple ways to heat an above ground pool. Here are a few of the things to consider before you make your final decision for your pool heater.

How Much Heat do You Need?

The decision on the type of heater you choose will depend on how much heat you want. Consider the beginning and the end of the season and the air temperatures for that time of the year. You can swim comfortably until the temperature dips below about 65-degrees Fahrenheit. Some of the types of heaters to consider include:

- Solar Blanket or Solar Ring - Provides 5 to 10-degrees of heat
- Solar Mats - A 4'x20' solar mat can give you 10 to 15-degrees of heat
- 50K BTU Electric Heater - Provides 15 to 20-degrees of heat
- 125K BTU Gas Heater - Give you 20 to 25-degrees of heat

Of course, with each of these heaters, you have to consider the operating cost, as well. Solar mats are the most energy-efficient with no cost to operate, since they use the sun, while the gas heater may be the most expensive to operate.

When do you Prefer to Swim?

If you swim mainly during the hottest time of the day, you may not need a heater to provide as much help. However, if you prefer to swim at night, a heater giving you a higher water temperature may be necessary.

A sola heater will provide the warmest water temperatures in the afternoon, while a gas heater is the best for quickly heating the pool if you are a weekend pool warrior. It's important to consider the type of swimming you do and match it to the right above ground heater for your needs.

If you're not sure what type of heater to get for your pool, an area expert can help. They will be able to recommend the right type and size to heat your pool and extend the swimming season.

What does it Cost to Replace your Pool Liner?

The pool liner is a very important part of your swimming pool. If it's not in good shape, it could cause all types of issues. When it comes time to replace the liner, it's important to understand how much this will cost.

The cost of your pool liner replacement actually includes two costs: The price of the actual liner and the installation cost. The cost will depend on many factors including the size of the pool, the thickness of the liner, what type of pool you have and the pattern. Here's a breakdown of the factors.

- Size - Obviously, the larger the pool is, the more expensive the liner will be.
- Thickness - Liners come with a thickness measured in mils. A 20 mil thickness is standard, but you can get a 25 or 30 mil thickness or some liners.
- Pattern - If you prefer a darker pattern, you can expect to pay more. The darker pattern requires more ink for production. A plain blue liner with no pattern will always be the cheapest option.
- Aboveground or Inground - Aboveground pool liners usually range from \$100 to \$500 based on the size, depth, pattern and thickness. If you need an inground pool liner, expect to spend \$500 to \$1,500 depending on the size, depth, pattern and thickness chosen.

Pool Liner Installation

Along with the actual cost of the pool liner, you must consider the installation cost. Some may try install the liner themselves, which can be a quite a task. However, if you hire a professional, the size, shape, material and equipment needed will all factor into the cost.

Installation of an aboveground liner usually runs from about \$500 to \$1,500, depending on the size of the pool and the condition of the pool and pool floor. For an inground pool, you can expect to pay \$1,500 to \$2,500 for liner installation. This will depend on the size, shape, condition and any prep work needing done before installation.

Working with a local pool shop may allow you to get a better price on installation than working with a larger shop. However, you should always get an estimate from somebody you trust before you commit to the liner and the installation.

The pressure cleaner works off of water pressure from the pump to keep your pool clean. Some will connect to the main pump, while others may use a booster pump. The water pressure moves the cleaners throughout the pool as it scoops up debris.

Pros

- Doesn't require as much cleaning since the debris goes into an attached bag
- Very durable and low maintenance
- Cleans up large debris, such as dead bugs, leaves and blades of grass

Cons

- Won't scrub the walls of your pool
- Not very good with smaller or fine particles in the water

The Suction Pool Cleaner

Another type of automatic pool cleaner is the suction cleaner. This type of cleaner will use suction to move throughout the pool and vacuum debris off the floor and the walls. The debris is sucked into your pool filter, which makes this a very effective cleaner.

Pros

- Cleans very throughout by picking up smaller particles including dirt and sand
- Less expensive than many other automatic cleaners

- Scrubs the walls of your pool
- Moves more water through your filter, faster

Cons

- Doesn't work well on larger, floating objects
- Sends dirt into your filter, which will require more cleaning of your pump

The Robotic Pool Cleaner

A cleaner with an electric motor, the robotic pool cleaner provides its own pump and filters. It will gather debris and monitor your pool with a computer chip. This type of cleaner can even be controlled remotely.

Pros

- Cleans both small and large debris from your pool
- Scrubs the tile line and the pool walls
- Circulates the pool water better
- Learns how to clean your pool more efficiently over time

Cons

- Limited by the length of the cord
- Requires more frequent cleaning
- More expensive than other types of cleaners
